How to get your TRN verified in Dubai

Getting a TRN in Dubai is easy and it's one of the first things you should do when moving to the UAE. But where do you start? And what if your TRN in Abu Dhabi doesn't match your passport name? Fortunately, the process of getting your TRN verified in Dubai is relatively straightforward, so we've created this guide to help you through it step by step! Know the basics

It's crucial to understand how a company operates before you apply for a job with them. Visit their website and see if they have a Careers section, which will provide insight into what they are looking for. If they don't list their requirements, or if they seem vague, make sure you contact them directly by phone or email before you apply. This ensures that you give them exactly what they are looking for from an applicant.

What documents do you need?

In order to get a valid Tawteen (residence visa) you will need a verifiable address, a salary slip and proof of health insurance. If you do not have an Emirates ID, you will also need an acceptable birth certificate and either an Emirates ID or passport. For example, if you are applying for a spouse visa for one of your parents it would not be necessary for them to have an Emirates ID because they can apply using their passport.

Where do you go?

Unfortunately, you can't apply for a TRN on your own. You need a sponsor and his or her help throughout the process, so start by finding an employer or third-party agent who will sponsor you. (We'll get into that soon.) The best place to go is at any government office; many services are offered without charge. Once you're there, present your sponsor's identification card along with yours, and fill out a form that details why you want one.

Do you want to hire someone or can you do it yourself?

If you want someone else to do it, ask around and find a good immigration lawyer. These people will have experience dealing with each department involved, and they know how long things take. If you're going to do it yourself, I'd highly recommend finding a friend or relative who speaks Arabic. My wife helped me out when I was setting up my business, just because she knew how important time was for me.

What is the cost?

If you don't have an Emirates ID and want a work permit, that will cost an additional AED 1250. If you do have an Emirates ID but need a work permit, that will cost AED 375. If you have neither of these and just want a residence visa, it will cost AED 225. There is no difference between what nationality or gender need visas; it only matters if you are from outside of UAE or already living there and seeking residence status.

What to expect at the verification centre

The verification process is very quick. You'll need to present 3 documents: Your passport, an employment contract and a copy of your Emirates ID. Note that these are not mandatory requirements – you can still submit your application even if you don't have all three documents with you. They may ask for additional information, but it's highly unlikely that they will give you any trouble.
